Dear Friends

Colour is one of the great joys of life.

A bank of green grass in springtime, with a gentle blue sky in the background, a tree coming to life the textured browns and greys of the bark, with leaves starting to appear, with the tree sitting serenely in a lake of crocuses of many shades of purple and yellow; on a branch sits a robin: grey and red in beautiful, winsome harmony.

I know a black dress is an essential in every lady's wardrobe; but if clothes could only be black, white or shades of grey how dull parties, weddings and life would be: no kilts, no ridiculous ties! Babies dressed only in black grey or white would be a denial of their new life.

Or if footballs teams had to play in white at home and black when away and supporters could not wear their team's colours something essential would be lost from the beautiful game. I know that flags can be a source of bigotry and nationalism of a corrupting kind; but there is something of the dark blue and white of the saltire that moves anyone with Scottish blood in their veins.

And so we could go on. Colour is an integral part of our existence it is part of what we are as human beings.

This is how I feel about Christ and Christmas. When folk mock the Christian faith and imply that one is a fool to believe in these ancient myths my soul shrinks within me at the loss of colour from my life.

For the Pharisees of Jesus' day life was black and white: the woman caught in adultery had to be stoned to death or the law of Moses abandoned. Jesus introduced carnelian red mercy to the picture and changed the world for ever. Nicodemus came to Jesus seeking straight answers to straight questions; Jesus spoke of the new life needful to know the Father, He painted a gentle, verdant green into Nicodemus' world.

White is of course, made up of the three primary colours: red green and blue; and the pure goodness of Jesus is always the coming together of His delight in His Father's will, His humility and His grace. There is no darkness to be found in Him, for he never ceases to delight in His Father's goodness and is ever gentle and full of compassion.

In the hands of an expert photographer black and white film can be most expressive: it is in the black and white of Calvary, the pure crystal goodness of Christ against the corruption of the authorities and the spite of the crowd that we see God's goodness vividly.

I love Christmas, because Christmas was when the world changed from being black and white to colour. When Jesus restored Bartimaeus' sight life, for the once blind man, it was no longer just a matter of survival. He went with Jesus and watched as Jesus healed, forgave, taught, prayed and befriended the friendless. He could not only see again but he could see the beauty of life in a wonderful array of colour.

It is always a magical moment, either in George Square or in a front room, when the Christmas lights are turned on. This Christmas let us pray that the Holy Spirit will turn on in our hearts the Christmas light of divine beauty that shines from Christ Jesus.

With our prayerful good wishes for a very Blessed Christmas and health in the new Year.

# **Prayer Points**

# 'Here am I. Send Me!'

'I said, "Here am I. Send me!""

Isaiah 6:8 NIV

Isaiah writes, 'Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I. Send me!" He said, "Go...!"' (vv. 8-9 NIV 2011 Edition). In the preceding Scriptures Isaiah was making all sorts of excuses and telling God why he wasn't qualified to do the job. But in God's kingdom, calling trumps credentials every time! And the litmus test isn't experience or expertise, it's availability and teachability. If you are willing to go when God gives you the green light, He will take you to inaccessible places and do impossible things. Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, Esther, Moses, Samuel, David, and Isaiah all have one thing in common. They all said, 'Here am I.' Isn't it ironic that we spend so much time and energy trying to figure out how to get to where God wants us to go, when all we have to do is simply say, 'Here am I'? It's God's job to get us to where He wants us to go; our job is to make ourselves available. Like a doctor on call or a police officer on duty or a firefighter on shift, it's our readiness to respond that God is looking for. Sometimes it's a simple prompting to go out of our way and love our next-door neighbour. Sometimes it's a calling to move halfway around the world. But it always starts with the little three-word prayer of availability: 'Here am I.' That's what Moses said at the burning bush. That's what Caleb said when he finally set foot in the Promised Land. And that's what God wants you to say today.
