Dear Friends

For some time I have felt uneasy about Advent and Christmas. It should be a time of preparation and celebration, but instead, people are more stressed and busier than ever. 'Are you ready for Christmas?' is a common greeting at this time of year. The usual frustrated answer is 'presents have still to be purchased, food needs to be bought, parties organised'.

It is right that Christmas should be a great celebration, but the real question is, what are we celebrating and how can we best do this? Are we ready to take on board the real truths that evoke that question – are we ready for Christmas?

The season of Advent is an opportunity to prepare ourselves for this festival; perhaps to give more time to reflect on the real meaning of Christmas. Advent means a coming; like a dawn heralds a new day. As we prepare for this new day we can reflect on the truth that Christ himself is the true meaning of Christmas. He is the incarnate Son of God. He is Christmas.

All these years ago only a handful of people made ready for the day that Christ was born. There were others who were invited to celebrate his birth such as the shepherds who responded to a vision of angels announcing the birth of a saviour, and who hurried to the stable where the baby Jesus was lying in a manger - a trough from which the cattle would normally feed. It was a sordid place beautified only by the presence of the Christ child which is depicted on Christmas cards.

One of the most important truths of Christmas for us to think about is that God had prepared for the birth of his son but he chose for him to share the poverty and squalor, which is often the plight of refugees and other outcasts of this world who are denied the material comforts for which we crave. Surely the true joy of Christmas is when we realise that God made himself known in his son, sharing the poverty of a world that was not prepared for his coming.

A Christmas Prayer

Dear Lord, what's it really all about, this "season of celebration"? People rushing everywhere, overspending, double-booking diaries in frantic attempts to meet the demands of a twenty-first century Christmas. And what about those who find Christmas anything but joyful – those who have lost loved ones, those who are old and alone and tired and longing for it all to be over? What's it really all about? Lord, in the middle of the busyness and bustle, help us to remember that this is nothing new. Jesus came into a world of rush and frenzied activity. He came to a town so busy that there was no room for his family. And help us to remember that you know what it's like to have a loved one – your dear Son - away from home at Christmas. Lord, still our hearts, and open them to recognise and receive your great gift to us. May we make room for Jesus and know the peace and security of his presence this Christmas. Help us to know that this is what it's really all about. In the name of Jesus. Amen.

Path of Renewal December 2019

Many of you will be aware that the Church of Scotland has announced major plans to reform the structure of their administration at the top level and also at Presbyteries. Eventually the opportunity to change the ways the Board and Session operate will come round. There is a general feeling that unless there is a change in the outlook of the church and the way we relate to our communities it may struggle to survive. The Path of Renewal group has been looking at various ideas to introduce initiatives and consider where we can engage more with the community. Some of these relate to whether slightly different forms of worship can be tried out such as services in the hall, outdoor Easter service and services with a particular theme. It is recognised that some people are resistant to change and this is understandable where the same style of worship has been followed for a long time. The messages received from other ministers involved in path of renewal is that we need to engage with those who are unhappy, that standing still in the old ways may not be the best way forward and to suggest that they could open their hearts to something new.

Another important aspect of this theme is that we are now in vacancy and any prospective new minister will be looking to a church showing a faith in God, but also willing to embrace change, to be a church which welcomes young and old and is moving forward during the vacancy period.

I have been to another church recently which has also just gone into vacancy. The message in their magazine could be one for us to follow. It states "It may be some time yet before we hear from Presbytery what the future holds...... It is so important that the spiritual and social life of the church continues to be active in a vacancy. The support of every member of the congregation is vital to keep the momentum alive during the vacancy."

Christian Aid at Christmas

BVP is part of a group of 5 churches in the Western District group. The other participating churches are Broomhill/Hyndland, Jordanhill, Our Lady of Perpetual Succour and All Saints Episcopal. Scotstoun were also involved previously but have dropped out. During Christian Aid week in May a total of £3274 was raised between the 5 churches. Recently the sum of £956 was raised at the Christmas Fayre held in Broomhill Church. The next event is the annual **Carol Service** which takes place on **Saturday 21st December at All Saints Church, Woodend Drive Jordanhiil at 6.30pm**. If you are free then please come along and support this. There will be a collection for Christian Aid. Supporting Christian Aid has the benefit of not only helping a worthy cause but also an ecumenical one of meeting people from other churches.

The theme for the Christmas Appeal 2019 is to give more mothers a chance to use their God-given gifts. At Christmas we remember the powerful story of Mary's journey to Bethlehem to give birth to Jesus. Her bravery and devotion brought her family out of danger and enabled God's peace hope and love to enter the world. Today many brave mothers are fighting the odds to bring their children into the world in places such as Afghanistan and India. More information on this topic is available at caid.org.uk/Christmas.

For many years members of our congregation have supported Christian Aid by donating items such as ink cartridges, spectacles and used stamps. This is not presently in operation but the Church of Scotland has a similar scheme for stamps and you can still deposit these in the box provided in the vestibule. This collection will help the Chigodi Women Centre in Blantyre, Malawi which aims to improve the socioeconomic status and employment chances of the women.

Prayer Points

How to get back up

'Though I have fallen, I will rise.'

Micah 7:8 NIV

We all get despondent from time to time. It can happen on the heels of a great success or victory. Counsellors say that for every high there is a corresponding low. Or it can be caused by disappointment in people; someone we trusted lets us down and we experience anger and resentment. When we lose a job, we don't just lose our financial security; sometimes we lose our identity and sense of worth as a person. The cause of our despondency is often physical. When we don't get enough rest, proper food, and exercise, we get run down. Sometimes the cause is chemical. When the brain's chemical messengers that are called neurotransmitters are healthy, we are too. But when some of those transmitters, such as serotonin and dopamine, are absent, low, or imbalanced, we struggle and feel depleted. In this case medication may be needed to correct the chemical imbalance. And the cause can also be spiritual. Jesus said that Satan comes to 'steal, kill, and destroy' (John 10:10 GNT). That's why the Bible says, 'Be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armour of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against...spiritual forces of evil' (Ephesians 6:10-12 NIVUK). Often spiritual warfare is either at the root of our problems or is exacerbating them. So each morning when you get dressed, be sure to put on your spiritual armour and draw on 'His mighty power' throughout the day. When you're down, that's how you get back up.

BGEA Gospel Outreach – 30th May 2020

The late Billy Graham, who died in February 2018 aged 99, is acknowledged throughout the world as one of the most inspirational preachers of the gospel in our time.

His first 'crusade' was in 1947 and his last in 2005. In total he preached in 417 venues in 185 countries, including the former USSR, India, China and as far away as New Zealand. His first visit to the UK was to London in 1954. He came to Glasgow (Kelvin Hall) in 1955 and thousands of people heard the gospel message for the very first time.

In June 1991 he returned to Glasgow (Celtic Park) as part of the 'Mission Scotland Campaign' and once again his powerful gospel message resulted in many, many hundreds of people accepting Jesus as their Lord and Saviour. I know for a fact, that there are several members of BVP whose lives were changed through Billy Graham's preaching.

The work which Billy Graham started more than 70 years ago continues through the 'Billy Graham Evangelistic Association' – (BGEA) and a UK Tour will take place in 2020. It will visit 8 different locations starting in Glasgow on 30th May (the only Scottish venue) and end in London on 4th October.

The venue in Glasgow will be the **SSE Hydro** and there will be no charge for entrance because all costs are being met by the BGEA. This gospel outreach service will be led by the evangelist **Franklin Graham**, who is the eldest son of the late Billy Graham. Music for the event will be provided by 'Michael W Smith & Planetshakers' who are a dynamic praise band.

This will be a wonderful opportunity for church members to be part of this unique outreach event and it will also provide each one of us with an opportunity to invite family members, friends and neighbours to come and hear a 'message of real hope'.

I will provide further information about this event early in the New Year, but in the meantime, please put 30th May 2020 in your diary – please keep that evening free !!!

Why not join the Gift Aid scheme?

If you pay income tax but don't already belong to the Gift Aid Scheme within Balshagray Victoria Park, then why not join in 2020?

BVP would then be able to claim back the amount of tax corresponding to your offerings.

- ❖ You don't commit to donate a specific amount the Church just reclaims tax on the offerings you have made.
- ❖ 25p is reclaimed for every pound donated (since for every £1 donated an amount of £1.25 had to be earned, corresponding to 25p of basic rate tax at 20%). Here are some examples:

Offerings made	Tax reclaimed
£100	£25
£500	£125
£1,000	£250

- ightharpoonup In 2018 BVP received over £15,000 in reclaimed tax as a result of Gift Aid offerings.
- You may donate through Free Will Offering (FWO) envelopes, by standing order, or by occasional cheques.
- Gift Aid details are strictly confidential, accessible only by the Gift Aid Convenor, and possibly by the Treasurer and HMRC auditors.

Rev Andrew Watt First Minister of Balshagray Parish Church

There is a plaque in the Centenary Chapel in memory of the Rev Andrew Watt the first minister of Balshagray Parish Church who died within a few months of his appointment. Jane Belmore recently asked me what I knew about him. As the answer was "very little" I decided to do some research.

Andrew Watt was born on the 16th April 1869 in West Mauchan, Larkhall, the youngest of five sons born to William and Helen Watt who were married in East Kilbride in 1856. His father was a farmer and in the 1881 Census it is noted they are living on a 50 acre arable farm. By 1891 Andrew, now 21, is one of five boarders living at 7 Rupert Street in Glasgow in a boarding house owned by a Christina Kydd. He is listed as a Classical Master. By 1901 he is a boarder living in Kilmarnock and is assistant minister at Riccarton Parish Church. He marries Mary Burns a 31 year old teacher in Glasgow on the 17th July 1902, by which time he is the Minister at Ceres Parish Church in Fife. Their only child William Montgomery Watt was born on the 14th March 1909. On the 3rd October 1909 he was preached in to Balshagray Parish Church as its first Minister, a position he held until his untimely death at the age of 41 on the 12th May 1910.

His widow Mary died on the 3rd March 1937 in Edinburgh where she had lived with their son. She was 66.

Their son was Professor William Montgomery Watt, Professor of Arabic and Islamic studies at the University of Edinburgh. He dedicated his life to the promotion of dialogue between Christians and Muslims. He was the author of over thirty books many on Islam and the last being "A Christian Faith for Today" published in 2002 when he was 93. Educated at George Watson's in Ediinburgh, he went on to take three degrees in six years first at Edinburgh University and then at Baliol College, Oxford. He was ordained in the Scottish Episcopal Church in 1940 where he served in a curacy in London. From 1943 to 1946 he served as an Arabic specialist to the Anglican Bishop of Jerusalem. He returned to Edinburgh University in 1946 where he remained until his retiral in 1979. He died aged 97 on the 24th October 2006 and was survived by his wife Jean, four daughters and a son. (This brief history this could be an article in itself.)

At the time of Andrew Watt's death his brother Allan lived in Newlands in Glasgow. Three of his four brothers were drapers. In 1910 Allan Watt was selling ribbons and lace from a shop in Elmbank Street before opening his shop Watt Brothers in 1915 in Sauchiehall Street which has now just gone into administration.

The Persecuted Church at Christmas

Christmas is a very special time for Christians throughout the world, as we unite to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. As Christmas approaches, many of us will be busy preparing to celebrate this 'festive season' by buying gifts, sending cards and looking forward to sharing time with family and friends.

For many thousands of Christians throughout the world, the special happiness which Christmas brings, will be very difficult to enjoy, because they are separated from loved ones. In Syria, for example, many hundreds of Christian women are without their husbands and their children without their fathers, either because they have been killed in the war or were abducted because they are Christians. These men are held captive in prisons, in locations which have never been disclosed and this has been the situation for the past 6 years.

Christmas is also about 'hope' and for many Christian women struggling to cope, it is their Christian faith that sustains them, particularly at this time of year. In the Middle East and in many other countries, single women living alone or with children are very vulnerable and are looked down upon and are quite often subjected to harassment and persecution, in all is various forms.

The lack of tolerance towards the 'Christian Church' is more prevalent in those countries which are Islamic, such as Saudi Arabia. However, this problem is also extremely serious in India and in many African countries, where extremists are trying to take control, sweeping aside the civil rights of Christians. Unfortunately, Christmas will be very difficult for those Christians who are living under such oppressive conditions.

May I encourage you this Christmas to reflect on the 'Suffering Church' and to continue to pray not just for those who are being persecuted, but also for their perpetrators.
