From our Interim Moderator

Friends at BVP I hope you are all keeping well over these long and difficult days of virus concerns, self-isolation and social distancing. God made us as social creatures and it is a real struggle for many of us I know. I wanted to share with you some thoughts about our current situation that came from a comment I read in a news report this week: 'All we are doing right now is existing'. It came from the lips of a keen gardener, in relation to garden centres being shut and his being unable to do things in the garden he wanted to do while self-isolating in his house. He was clearly frustrated by it. The same day I read this verse from Ecclesiastes 7:2 'Sorrow is better than laughter, for by sadness of face the heart is made glad'. These words are from the Wisdom section of our bibles, but my initial thought was what a depressing message! Especially these days, when laughter (like gardening supplies and many other means of pleasure) can be in short supply. Think about it - on what planet is sorrow or sadness better than laughter? But sorrow can be better than laughter, as the verse implies, when the sorrow brings about greater gladness.

Think for a moment of a scenario where these are wise words: Imagine a bunch of kids playing in a garden with a fence around it, but immediately behind the fence is a 40 foot drop. (I know someone with

a garden like this – they need a very strong fence and the drop is into a rocky burn!). The kids are laughing and playing and having a ball. Then one little boy trips next to the fence and falls on it, and it breaks because the post is rotten. The fence collapses and the screws scratch him, quite badly. He is hurt and sad and the laughter and fun has all stopped! Sorrow has taken over where laughter was. BUT, no-one fell down the drop. No-one was seriously injured. The parent sees the fence is weak and bans the kids from the garden until it is rebuilt and secure (very secure!). Afterwards kids can play with without risk, therefore with greater gladness. In this scenario, the sorrow of the child is much better than the laughter of the children, cos a greater good came out of it. More joy and more laughter – a better joy – came out of the sorrow.

Sorrow is better than laughter when the sorrow leads us to a better, more lasting, more real, more secure gladness. And God in his wisdom does that sometimes – brings us sorrow instead of laughter. Sometimes sorrow is better - but God's goal is a more durable, lasting, even eternal gladness found through Jesus Christ, often in the midst of sorrow. I hope that we can all use this time of difficulty to draw nearer to the source of the greatest, enduring, and highest joy and pleasure. God bless

I enjoy attending 7 or 8 services each week, but I really miss being in BVP..

Our national church is often accused of taking forever to make decisions but in this case the outreach activity was up and running within a short while after the suspension of all services. This is church at its best, working together with a can-do attitude. That's what we need in these anxious, uncertain days. This is what our normal church time has been preparing us for, our worship, our prayers, our celebrations of life and love, our patient building of community. Our acts of generosity and kindness are all about being the body of Christ, and now as the externals are forcibly stripped away from us we are discovering that we are still the body of Christ.

The coronavirus pandemic is a dangerous and disruptive force in the world today, but the Lord is not in a panic and has not been taken by surprise. He has a way for you and your church not only to survive this crisis but to minister encouragement and truth in a deeply troubled period of our history. God works in mysterious ways. By coming together through this cancellation of services, we may bring our church and parish family even closer together.

The words which the inspiring veteran Captain Tom Moore said at the end of his 100 laps of his garden were, "At the end of the day we shall all be okay. The sun will shine on you again and the clouds will go away." Due to Ann and I not being able to move house, most of our goods are still in boxes awaiting our removal, but I have a Cross which I can look at. This gives me confidence that this pestilence will be crushed, the risen Son is always with us and God will call us into a hopeful and promising future.

Finance

The impact of coronavirus is having a significant effect on all churches including our own. The sudden lockdown meant that some of the information I need to produce comparative figures is not available to me and the other aspect is that it is no longer possible to compare like with like. At this stage to the end of April, direct payments to the bank are £8370 compared to £10815 in the same period last year. A reduced figure was budgeted for this year due to some departures and this section of giving is so far unaffected by the closure. In fact several people have changed to direct giving already following the request sent out recently. Our loss of income is occurring as a result of the closure of the halls, which is around £600pm and the cancellation of Sunday services which was averaging around £1600 pm from the open plate and FWO. I would ask people who have not already done so to consider changing to direct giving (church account is s/c 80-07-55 a/c number 00575186). There is further information on this topic on the Church of Scotland website. One positive development for BVP was the letting of the manse being completed just before the lockdown. This will produce a net income of around £1300 pm.

Please also be aware that the Board have taken all reasonable steps to reduce expenditure where possible during these difficult times.

Understanding your desires

'Oh, taste and see that the LORD is good.'

Psalm 34:8 NKJV

When the Bible tells you what you ought to do, you can take it in two different ways: the ought of obligation or the ought of opportunity. The first kind refers to your duty. You ought to pay your taxes, you ought to keep your dog on a lead, you ought to take your driver's test. The second kind gives you life. You ought to take a break, you ought to see the world, you ought to taste this cake. The 'oughts' of Jesus' message are mainly the oughts of opportunity. And as you become more aware of this, you may start feeling guilty because your desire for God doesn't run deep enough. The problem is, you can't make yourself desire God more by simply telling yourself you should. But He is so gracious and patient in wanting you to want Him, that He is willing to work with this kind of honesty. That's why His Word says, 'Oh, taste and see that the Lord is good.' The word 'taste' is an invitation from a confident chef. You don't have to commit to eating the whole enchilada; just try a taste and if you don't like it you can skip the rest. The chef is convinced if he can just get you to take that first bite, you're going to want the whole thing. The truth is that the more you read God's Word and pray, the more rewarding it becomes and the more you are drawn to it. Yes, it begins as a discipline. But when you stick with it, it becomes a delight.

The Persecuted Church

Coronavirus, Lockdown, Pandemic, Self-Isolation and Social Distancing were not words that were in common use before the arrival of the virus Covid-19. The virus, which had its origins in China, spread rapidly from country to country and from continent to continent at an alarming rate. It is no respecter of age, social status or even religious persuasion and Christians, Muslims, Buddhists and Hindus, including those of no faith, have all succumbed to this virus.

Across the world, many Christians have lost all their income because of the lockdown, which has had a significant impact on their ability to buy food and other essential items. In some countries, when 'official aid' is being distributed, Christians are often at the end of the queue, simply because they are discriminated against. This is particularly the case for many Christians living in Pakistan and India and in several other Asian countries where it was already a 'hand to mouth' existence and the ongoing economic effects are for them guite devastating.

It is not only the effects of the Coronavirus that is impacting on the lives of Christians. In East Africa, several countries including Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia have all been affected by a plague of locusts and it is predicted that Uganda and South Sudan will be affected by June. Many Christians in these countries work in agriculture, and according to the UN World Food Programme, many countries in Africa are facing food shortages of "Biblical proportions". This is in addition to the worst ongoing humanitarian crisis for decades linked to the wars in Syria, Yemen and Libya and the effects of climate change and drought in many African countries.

The militant Islamist terrorist groups Al Shabab and Boko Haram believe they are immune from the effects of Coronavirus. They continue to attack villages during 'lockdown' and many Christians living in Nigeria, Chad, Somalia, Mozambique and Kenya have been killed and churches and property destroyed.
